BLESSED EDMUND RICE

Edmund Rice was born in Callan on June 1 1762. In 1802 he founded his first school in Waterford – Mount Sion - and gradually spread throughout the country. He died in Waterford on 29 August 1844. He was beatified by Pope John Paul II on October 6 1996.

96 schools in Ireland celebrated the feast day of Blessed Edmund on Friday, 5 May. Worldwide there are 270 schools stretching across the five continents with over 70,000 pupils. There are three schools in our diocese: primary schools in Callan and Kilkenny and the CBS Secondary school in Kilkenny. Last summer the secondary school in Callan joined with the Mercy Secondary school and Scoil Abhainn Rí continues the ethos of Edmund Rice in his home town.

BECOME A FRIEND OF ST MARY'S CATHEDRAL

THE BELLS OF ST MARY'S.

The Bells of St. Mary's was a 1945 American musical comedy-drama film starring Bing Crosby and Ingrid Bergman. Crosby in the persona of Fr O'Malley and Bergman as Sr Mary Benedict try to save their parish school.

But what of the **Bells of St Mary's** here in the marble city? The bell in St Mary's Cathedral tower is the work of the Murphy Foundry of Dublin and is dated 1869.

John Murphy (1837 – 1879), a coppersmith, established his business at 109 James's Street, Dublin, in 1837. In 1843 he branched out into bell founding, casting a bell for the church of Tuam and in the years that followed casting many single bells and at least eight rings of bells. His work can be seen and heard in many churches throughout Ireland and abroad: the cathedral churches of Thurles, Cork and Melbourne, the Redemptorist Monastery in Limerick and St Augustine's church in Dublin. Distinctive in their design Murphy's bells was thinner in profile than other bells of this period.

The bell is decorated with the crowned harp. The crowned harp was used by the Dublin Assay Office to assay and hallmark all gold and silver produced in Ireland since 1637 – The **Dublin Assay Office** was founded by a royal charter issued by King Charles I re-establishing the medieval Guild of All Saints. The crowned harp is clearly visible on the waist of the bell.

Another bell foundry in Dublin was founded by Matthew Byrne. He had been chief engineer in the Royal Navy and he established **The Fountain Head Iron Foundry** in Dublin in 1840. In 1887 the 'M Byrne Patent Rotary Mounting' was patented. This was a cast iron headstock through which a tapered boss on the crown of the bell was inserted and bolted in place using the crown staple bolt. A significant difference with this system was that simply by slacking the nuts the bell can be rotated thus presenting a new striking face to the tongue to strike. This increases the life of the bell beyond measure.

The tower bell in St Mary's hangs on this system.
