ST VICTORIA'S ALTAR AND FR CAVANAGH

In 1867 the relics of St Victoria were translated and entombed in the Cathedral on the occasion of celebrating 10 years since the consecration in 1857. On 13 October Bishop Moran presided as four priests carried the shrine containing the sacred relics into the cathedral.

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The shrine is in the form of a catafalque containing the image of the saint who appeared to have been in her seventeenth year. She had been sought in marriage by a patrician named Eugenius who was enraged by her refusal. He denounced her to the Roman magistrate as a Christian and was condemned to death. She was buried in the catacombs of Rome.

Rev Michael Kavanagh (Administrator of St Mary's 1865-1871) preached at the celebration to receive the sacred relics. Father Kavanagh had visited Rome and he was present when the body of St Victoria was dis-embombed during the excavations in the cemetery (catacombs) of St Callistus; as a mark of special favour the sacred relic was bestowed by the Sovereign Pontiff upon Bishop Moran and St Mary's Cathedral. The catafalque was originally placed in St Joseph's Chapel but during the re-ordering of the 1890s the altar was placed in its present position opposite the Sacred Heart Shrine.

Fr Michael Kavanagh was born in Hospital Lane, St James's Green to John Kavanagh and Mary Neary on 18 January 1828. He studied at St Kieran's College from 1842 – 1849 (St Kieran's College was at this time located on the Callan Road – there since 1836). He attended St Patrick's College Maynooth from 1849-1856. After his ordination in 1856 he was appointed curate to St Mary's and in 1865 he was appointed Administrator. He died on 3 September 1871 and is buried in Mauldin Street graveyard. His only appointment was to the Cathedral. His uncle, Fr Patrick Neary, was born at Troy's Gate and was parish priest of Mullinivat from 1881-1887.

In 1866 he with Bishop Walsh attended a meeting with parishioners and citizens of Kilkenny to begin fundraising £1.600 for a new organ. During his time in the cathedral a storm destroyed the window in the south transept (1867) and Daniel Cullen generously donated £300 for the window of the Assumption of Our Blessed Mother in the north transept. Daniel Duigan donated the bell.

On 17 November 1864 Sir Robert Peel, Chief Secretary to Ireland, made an unexpected visit to Kilkenny. He visited St Mary's and the Freeman Journal reported: "Sir Robert was most agreeably surprised to see such a noble structure – an edifice built by the voluntary contributions of a generous, faithful and industrious people. None of the clergy men was in the church at the time, so that Sir Robert and party inspected it by themselves. He did not stay long but it would seem from his subsequent remarks that he took in at one glance all that was worth seeing."
